Making the most of participation

Last year we told many of you the "frozen chicken" story -- you might have laughed, but you knew it was true! When you come alone to a training experience -- especially one which has such a dramatically different way of working at its core, like the **Art of Hosting** -- you can feel like you're the only chook to have thawed out and gotten a new way of operating in the world. When you go back to the office, it can feel like a blast from the freezer. People roll their eyes, look at you in that patronising way and say: "You've been on a course, haven't you?".

And nothing changes...



We've learned in our own practice that this way of working takes a team to do it. If you want to shift the field in the place you work, you need to *be a field*, already operating in the new way -- and you can't do that alone! We encourage you to come along again (and we have a reduced rate for that!) and to bring others with you. If you know of others who'd like to attend, make sure they come with others so that they can put what they learn to work.

We have a special group rate -- 10 places at \$1,200 + GST each -- which a group can use across our events. That means that 5 people might attend in Auckland to focus on participatory leadership and 3 might attend in Wellington, bringing their strategic project to work on, and another few might go to Warrior of the Heart and focus on their leadership skills. This is one way to get the most bang for your buck!

We'd also like to encourage large organisations to consider being community-minded by using part of their group rate to support community and young people attending. That might mean you decide to send 8 people and sponsor 2 to attend. Or 5 people might come from your organisation and 5 from your wider stakeholder group. This is a great way to move your work forward together. *Contact us for more details*.

It has been wonderful to hear stories from participants about how they are using what they learned back in the workplace. We've heard about World Cafés popping up all over DOC and the LINZ team leading some great meetings. We've listened in as the FACS team at MSD has been sharing what they know with others and bringing this way of working to their wider field. We've been part of a team hosting a special event for the community at Great Start out in Taita. We've liked the approach the team is taking at Greater Wellington around involving the community in strategic planning. *What are you up to?* Tell us so we can share stories of success and we call can benefit.

Community of Practice

We've had three Community of Practice meetings so far in Wellington, covering off Open Space, World Café and most recently the Flow Game. An Auckland group has met as well. They were great opportunities to take our learning further. On **11 February** a hosting team has the opportunity to work with Mary-Alice to host a 2 hour "Good Engagement Seminar" for the Office of the Community & Voluntary Sector. **Two more people are needed for the team**, if you are interested, contact Mary-Alice. In **March** we'll have meetings with our international team in both Auckland and Wellington. If you haven't yet joined the Ning (GPS Community), there's an active trans-Tasman group already there and plenty of resources posted. If you let us know, we'll send you an invitation.



We're excited about the energy and skill that will be generated across the event series next year. We see the **Art of Hosting** as a pathway for development, and a way of looking at systems change with methodologies that can support all sizes of endeavours. Our goal is to host a series of events for people who want to answer the question:

How can we work differently, bring people with us, and get more than the results we're hoping for?
